

### What Everybody Ought to Know About Drawing

#### **Don't Know What to Draw**

Draw what you love. It will mean more if you draw what interests you. On the other hand if you want to practice your skills, drawing anything will do.

#### Afraid of the Blank Piece of Paper

Start making circles and ovals all over the paper. Think of it as a warm up exercise.

#### It's Not As Hard As You Think It Is

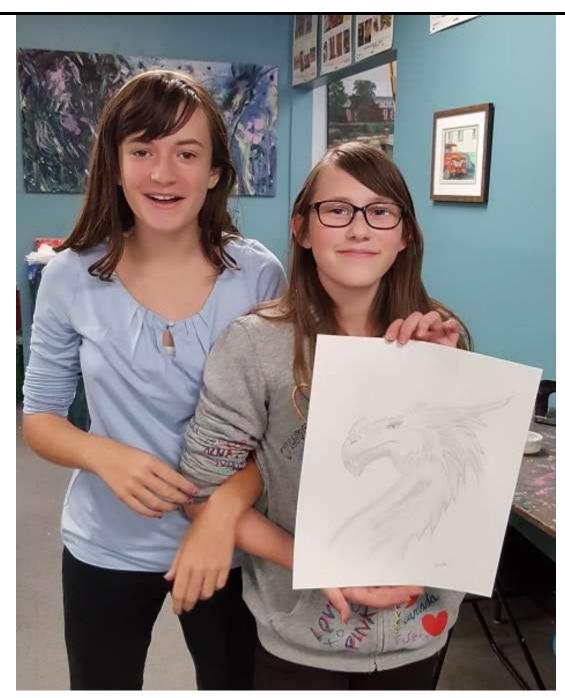
To become better at drawing, the number one rule is to draw what you actually see, not how you think it looks. Really look at the object and see how the "line" or outside shape changes direction and try to copy that on paper.

#### **Now We Are Getting Somewhere**

Look for angles and shapes. Use the negative shapes (background) and positive shapes (objects) to help you to draw. Use vertical and horizontal plumb-lines to line up images to help placement.

#### Still Need Help?

Sometimes it's easier to understand the process of drawing if you have someone show you how it's done. Take a class or watch a video to help you improve your drawing skills.

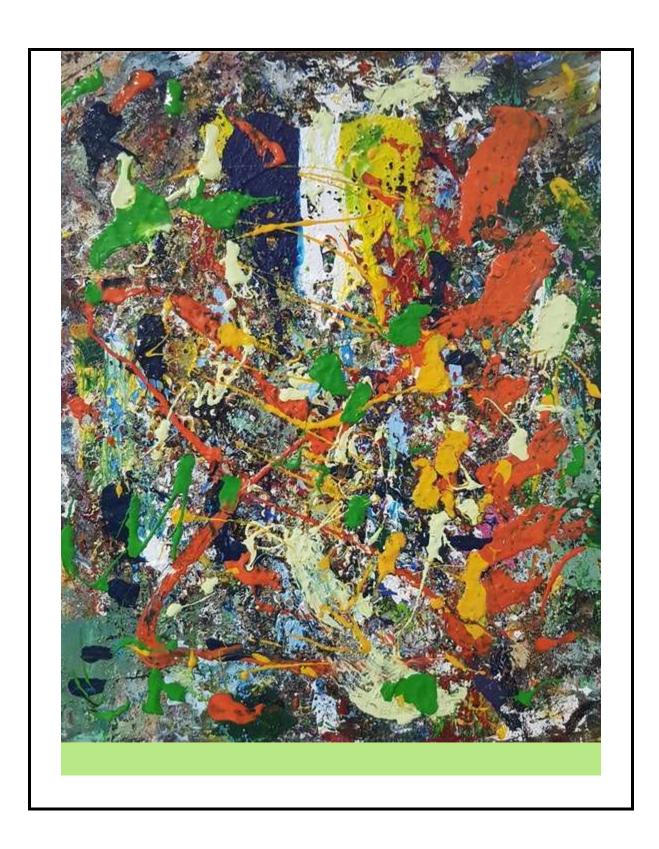
